SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS

1. If you could ask God a question and get a direct and immediate answer, what would you ask and why?
2. This series, Make Your Bed, is about how the little things in life matter, and can change your life and perhaps the world. One of the little things Jesus did was to ask questions. Jesus asks questions more than gives answers. What do you think he is doing? What is good about this approach and what is frustrating about it to you?
3. Pastor Joel chose one of the most important questions that Jesus asked of his followers in Mark 8:27-29. Read the passage. The question, "*who do you say I am?*" has many responses. Review the four Pastor Joel outlined by summarizing the intention and examples of how you might enter a conversation with someone from each response position.
4. Share your personal response to Jesus' question as well as how you arrived at your understanding.
5. Why is this question so important?
6. If Jesus asks questions as a way of deepening our understanding of what's most important in life, how might you be more like him when it comes to the art of asking questions. Give an example where you think asking questions might be better than giving answers.
